- Dale Grissom, sponsored by Randy Perkins, also submitted his application form and received his first reading.


General Announcements

Francois Masuka: Husband, Father, Director of International Student and Faculty Scholarship Services at Elon University, Paul Harris Fellow, Rotarian Extraordinaire, and Man with an Accent



Francois has been a member of our club since November 9, 2010. He was born in the Democratic Republic of Congo, where he earned a Masters Degree and taught English to

Peace Corps volunteers. He came here twenty-four years ago and has never returned. He currently works with international students at Elon University. His three daughters remain in the Congo. One is a lawyer, another is an accountant, and a third is a clothing designer. He mentioned that he will finish paying for their tuition this semester! Francois joked that he is the man with an accent, which is not surprising since he speaks five languages and "ain't from around here." He has served our club on the Projects Committee, Membership, and in other capacities. Some would even say that he would make a great president down the road.

Phil Smith: Entrepreneur and Proprietor of The Oak House in Elon, NC



Phil was born in Durham, NC. Nevertheless, he managed to become a Tar Heel fan. He earned a BS in Biology at UNC Wilmington, but veered away from medicine into Seminary at Mercer University. He eventually became a youth minister at First Baptist Church in Rome, GA. After that he ended up at Elon, where he served in various capacities, including Assistant University Chaplain & Director of Religious Life, Interim University Chaplain, Associate University Chaplain & Director of Religious Life, and Interim Director of Study USA. He taught on entrepreneurship, and, not surprisingly, felt challenged to live out his own dream, which resulted in launching The Oak House, which is a gourmet coffee, fine wine, craft beer, and artisan fare establishment located in Elon, NC across from Elon University. He guessed that he is the only ordained Baptist minister who is a bar owner.

His journey began when he watched the building located at 112 N. Williamson St. remain vacant for a year. He produced a business plan which he submitted to and accepted by the university. The idea was to provide a location with a climate that will foster relationship building and conversations among students, faculty, and townspeople. He quit his job at Elon at the age of forty-two and gathered support, financial and otherwise. He was able to fund his project without taking out a bank loan by borrowing from friends and conducting a kick start campaign online. One big asset is a twenty-three year old Elon alum who joined him and brought social media savvy to the operation. He opened on September 5, 2014.


The Oak House is a combination of Cheers and Central Perk, a place where friends and community gather. It is actually a combination of three spaces. The original bar remains as it was. Some of the colors were changed to more muted tones. The goal was to make it upscale without being "snooty." The middle area, which was the kitchen, was gutted to make room for a coffee serving line. What was the restaurant area was converted into a lounge with meeting tables and laptop locations. Not having a kitchen helps to keep the overhead down.



The Oak House employs mainly students and is open seven days a week. The main struggle is to find ways to remain profitable during university breaks and over the summer. 70% of the sales come from coffee, which was a surprise to Phil. They carry twenty-five varieties of organic coffee

which are roasted in Hillsboro.

President Lee presented Phil with a plaque to express our appreciation for his sharing with us.


