Cliff Parker: Elon Police Chief, Husband, Father, and Rotarian

Cliff came to Elon from Fayetteville to attend the university in 1978. He graduated in 1983 after meeting his wife, Karon, there, to whom he has been married to Karon for 31 years. She is a part-time realtor and a media coordinator for ABSS. They have three daughters. Cliff has been in law enforcement for 32 years. He started with the Burlington Police Department. Later he worked with the SBI before coming to Elon in 2012. Cliff also serves as an Alamance County Law Enforcement Executives Board Member, a Children's Executive Oversight Committee (CEOC) Board Member, a Family Justice Center Board Member, and a Citizens Coalition for A Drug Free Community Board Member.

Program: Anne Baker, Director of Alamance County Meals on Wheels, and Assistant Director Amanda Bartolomeo

Anne is a graduate of Elon University, is married, and has two daughters. She is the current executive director of Alamance County Meals on Wheels, a position she has held since 1998. Her husband just took a job in Louisiana, which necessitates that she and the family move there. As a result, her assistant, Amanda Bartolomeo, will soon be taking over her position. Amanda Bartolomeo graduated from UNCG with a BS degree in Public Health. She was a supervisor with Alamance County Meals on



Wheels for 4.5 years. Then she was employed with the Orange County Health Department for 7.5 years, managing multiple public health programs, grants, and volunteers. Currently, she is back with Alamance County Meals on Wheels as the Assistant Director. She is very passionate about working with seniors and is very excited to be helping out community members in her own county. Amanda has been married to her husband Mike for 10 years and they have a 4 year old daughter. Amanda made the presentation. The questions at the end were fielded by both Anne and Amanda.

Alamance County Meals on Wheels was formed on May 20, 1973 as Alamance County Council on Elderly, Inc. Over the years, the agency has offered hot home-delivered meals, frozen home-delivered meals, bad weather emergency meals, weekend meals, homemaker services, and a grocery assistance program. The agency began serving clients in February of 1974 and became a United Way agency in 1975. The First Presbyterian Church of Burlington has graciously housed the offices of ACMOW since its inception. The agency began delivering only one route, serving a few people, and now serves about 400 people each day on 25 different hot and frozen meal routes. The mission of Alamance County Meals on Wheels, Inc. is to provide in-home nutritional services in Alamance County which improve and enhance quality of life; nourish the body, mind, and spirit; and promote independent living for seniors and their families.

Information

- Each route has no more than 16 houses to deliver to./p>
- Most routes are less than 15 miles long.
- Each volunteer is trained by an ACMOW staff person during their first delivery experience.
- Each volunteer is provided a packet which includes: directions, which are turn by turn to each client's home; a pencil; hot pad; and menus.

Regular Delivery Route Volunteers:

- Are asked to deliver one day every four weeks on the same route.
- Can choose the area/route where they want to deliver meals.

Substitute Delivery Route Volunteers

- Deliver when there is a volunteer vacancy.
- Substitute drivers choose which route(s) they would like to substitute for and which days they might be free to assist.

Meal Distribution Site Greeters

Be a person who helps organize the volunteer packets and assists the day's volunteers in getting their meals to their vehicles at our Burlington location. Greeters volunteer from 9:30 until 10:45 a.m.

Emergency Meal Distribution

Once a year on a Saturday in November, Meals on Wheels delivers all the emergency meals for each of the clients. This is a great opportunity for someone who can't deliver during the week. Each volunteer is given boxes which contain shelf-stable meals to deliver to each client's home.

A fund raiser will be held on Sunday, May 17 at Cox Toyota from 2 until 8 pm - The 2015 Beach Blast, featuring the HWY 49 Band, Elvis, Line Dancing and Shagging, and he Castaways. Free admission!
